5 TIPS FOR CHOOSING THE PERFECT OUTFIT FOR YOUR SENIOR PHOTOS



Choosing what you wear to your senior photo shoot is kind of a big deal. After all, anyone who cares about fashion will tell you that what you wear is an expression of who you are. Its obviously not the only thing that defines you, but the wardrobe you choose will certainly make a first, and lasting, impression.

1. When selecting your session day outfits, think about what your style sense is and what you envision for the shoot. I highly recommend flipping through fashion magazines, perusing Pinterest, and checking out *in-the-know* blogs for inspiration. And don't forget that details matter from head to toe! Thoughtfully select the perfect shoes, accessories, jewelry, and even layering details, when putting together your outfits.
2. Dressing in layers is a great way to get the most out of your session. This will help to give you a different look without having to make an entire outfit change. Adding a vest, jacket, or fashionable scarf will effortlessly change up your outfit.
3. When choosing colors, remember that lighter colors tend to accentuate weight, while darker colors have a more slimming effect. Try to select colors that will not clash with each other or the season.
4. Since we allow multiple outfit changes, choose an outfit that you love, plus a separate one that your parents love. Parents don't always like similar styles as their children. Typically, parents have a more classic taste. Since styles change all the time, this will help you in the long run. Something that is trendy now will go out of style as the years progress. This way, everyone will be happy with the final results.
5. Finally, take some quick snapshots of yourself and ask others for their thoughts and opinions. From there, you can make any adjustments or narrow down your wardrobe selections.

P.S. I DO suggest bringing a few backup garments and accessories to the actual photo session, just in case!
