
Rationale


Family Voices Inc., a national group, found that 14.6 million children ages 0–17 (almost 20% of all children) in the US have a special health care need (SHCN), such as: autism, cerebral palsy, developmental delay, intellectual disabilities, depression, learning disabilities, epilepsy, etc. ('One in Five Report', 2015). Special health care needs lead to more health care utilization than children without SHCN.

STATS AT A GLANCE:

4x the number of hospitalizations 5x the number of prescriptions 7x the number of days in hospital care 7x the number of annual visits to providers

Furthermore, the majority of children with SHCN have co-occuring health conditions and require multiple specialized services. The health status needs of children with SHCN increase in complexity and impact as they grow.









Family Support

SIBSHOPS: 20 Siblings from grades K-6 met monthly through our Sibshops Program, gaining support, resources, and connection as they navigate their role as a brother or sister of a sibling with a disability or special healthcare need.

MOMS GROUP: 14 Moms participated throughout the semester

AFTER THE NICU GROUP: 9 Moms participated throughout the semester

RARE DISEASE GROUP: 17 Moms participated throughout the semester

DADS GROUP: 8 Dads participated throughout the semester

BLACK PARENTS GROUP: 27 Black Parents participated throughout the semester

TRAINED PARENT MENTORS: 90 Active Mentors available for matching

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES INCLUDE:

- Free Community Referral assistance with connecting families to a variety of local and statewide support and advocacy resources
- Distribute statewide Family Support Program Summer Camp Guide through our website and social media campaigns

TOTAL NICU FAMILIES SERVED (BEDSIDE SUPPORT): 422 Families

HOME VISITATION PROGRAM (For Guilford County families whose infant meets Infant Toddler Program eligibility (includes NICU, Central Nursery, and infants delivered in surrounding hospitals):

• 24 Families Served

• 142 Virtual Calls (due to Covid)

BOOKS FOR BABIES (2X PER MONTH): 1,260 Books were provided for NICU families, promoting early literacy, bonding, and early language development

SIBLING SUPPORT BAGS: 244 Bags

BABY BOXES (SAFE-SLEEP): 62 Baby Boxes

CRIBS FOR KIDS: 34 Families (45% of the Elizabeth Closet families that we served received a Pack and Play)

ELIZABETH'S CLOSET (BABY BASICS SUPPLIES): 76 Families, 61 Baby Basics Pack

BACKPACK BEGINNINGS PARTNERSHIP: 16 families were provided with packages of diapers, wipes, and nonperishable food for a period of 6 months through our new partnership with Backpack Beginnings

FROGS (NICU POSITIONING SUPPORT): 57 Frogs

GAS VOUCHERS: 147 Gas Cards at \$10 a card

MEAL CARDS/GROCERY CARDS: 72 families received a gift card for a total \$1,470 value

NICU SUPPORT EVENTS: 3 virtual events with 12 parents attending, 2 craft sessions with 31 parents attending (one family at a time due to Covid)







Volunteers

From volunteers who sew blankets for our NICU babies, to hundreds of handmade face masks when we faced the pandemic, volunteers who gathered in our office to help stuff hundreds of bags for our UNITE event, to organizing our Elizabeth Closet Baby Basics Supplies, to hosting NICU book drives, providing snacks for our Sibshops meetings, donating their time to work as NICU Support Staff, helping families feel seen during their stay, we could go on! 

"Understanding the Needs of Inclusion Takes Everyone"

UNITE is one of our most popular annual Community Events and this year drew more crowds than ever before! This year's event was planned and held in conjunction with Downtown Greensboro, Greensboro Parks and Rec, and Greensboro Downtown Parks. It is free and open to the public, with the purpose of both providing resources to the families of children with a disability or special healthcare need as well as giving an opportunity for the general public to become better informed of the diversity found within our community.

- This year's event was a drive-thru event (due to COVID-19) and held in Downtown Greensboro between LeBauer Park and Center City Park.
- 423 people were in attendance with 22 in-person nonprofit vendors and entertainment represented!
- A Resource Guide was distributed to all families who came through, listing all of the organizations in our community who serve families of individuals with a disability (including contact information).
- UNITE Bags were also provided so families could compile resources and goodies distributed by the individual booths.
- We received such rave reviews from vendors and families alike that we plan to incorporate certain elements of the drive-thru model for subsequent years, even if COVID resolves, to accommodate medically-fragile children.









Holiday Jamboree

Holiday Jamboree is our annual special holiday event for our families of children with a disability, special healthcare need, or families who experienced a NICU stay. In years past, we have held this event in person at the Haynes Inman School Lunchroom but due to COVID-19, we decided to host a drive-thru version instead.

- This event is free, open to the public, and held in December on a Saturday morning.
- It is a wonderful opportunity for parents to receive resources and connect with other families in the community with similar experiences.
- 26 families and 45 Children were in attendance (not including the FSNCC Staff, Board, and Volunteers who helped run the event).
- Goodie bags were distributed with pre-packaged warm biscuits from Biscuitville, hot cocoa mix, a coloring activity, a holiday craft activity, and brochures about our programming.











Our Funding

- Annual Fundraisers (including Poker for Preemies, which raises over 30% of our funding)
